# **BACKGROUND**

The organization named Palashipara Samaj Kallayan Samity (PSKS) was established as a Club by some enthusiastic youths of village Palashipara of Tentulbaria Union under Gangni Upazila of Meherpur District belonging to the south-east region of Bangladesh on 15 February 1970. The initiators were: 1) Md. Nazrul Islam (President), 2) Md. Suzauddin (Vice-President), 3) Md. Mosharrof Hossain (Secretary), 4) Md. Emdadul Haque (Treasurer), 5) Md. Rustom Ali (Subscription Collector), 6) Md. Abdul Aziz (Librarian), 7) Md. Zohir Uddin (Member), 8) Md. Abdul Jalil (Member), 9) Md. Abul Hossain (Member), 10) Md. Daulat Hossain (Member), 11) Md. Babur Ali (Member), 12) Md. Daud Hosain (Member), 13) Md. Nafar Uddin (Member), 14) Md. Golam Hossain (Mmeber), 15) Md. Ayeen Uddin (Member) and 16) Md. Mosharef Hossain (Mmeber). The organization came into being in concern of education and control of early marriage and exceeding population in the un-elevated and problematic area. The Club had no Office of its own till 1975. The Library was started in the wall-almirah in the reading room of the Founder Secretary Md. Mosharrof Hossain with personal endeavour of the members.

Despite unwillingness, Md. Forman Ali built an office room in his own land adjacent to his house in 1975 and allowed to resume the club activities there. All the members built there a room with muddy walls and straw-shade with their physical labour. As the number of readers in the library was very poor, there started Adult Education Program voluntarily in 1975. The organization got registered with the Department of Social Welfare on 20 August 1976. As a result of getting registration, enthusiasm and inspiration of the members increased gradually. Most of the members of the club were then victimized to early marriage. Realizing their own necessity, they became clients of family planning through establishing personal contact to the Office of Family Planning and collecting contraceptives, they distributed it among the close connected people.

In quest of further development of the club, some club members went to visit 'The Aruapara Club' in Kushtia in 1977. There found a letter in Bangla from Family Planning International Assistance (FPIA) in a dustbin of the Club. Taking the letter with consent of a member of that club PSKS wrote a letter to FPIA. In this contrary they sent several numbers of cartoons of contraceptives directly to PSKS Club through a representative of Home-bound Shipping Corporation without any prior information or contact. On receipt this the club members became more inspired and felt high intentness to work and they resume voluntary FP service very secretly. The cause for secrecy was that then it was much difficult to openly say about family planning. Afterwards the Club got registered with the Department of Family Planning on 15 August 1978 as per advice by the then Thana Family Planning Officer, Mr. Anwaruzzaman. PSKS got Tk.3, 000 as donation from the Department of Family Planning in that year. Having received the donation, a pervasive response to work rose among all.

Later on a team of delegates came from the Department of Family Planning to evaluate PSKS's activities. They informed that it would not be possible to grant PSKS any further donation as it was for the urban areas. They divulged high satisfaction at PSKS's performance. The evaluation team, as consolation, assured that they would recommend for PSKS to some foreign donor that would have intention to work in the rural areas. As they said, so did they! A letter was sent from "The Asia Foundation" in 1980. And as a result of contact in accordance with that letter, Officers from country and abroad in favour of "The Asia Foundation" came to visit PSKS for several times. Next time they themselves prepared for PSKS a project proposal which was submitted to the government's National Committee "FPCVO" and after rambling for many times, PSKS was granted a budget of Tk.152,100 which was beyond expectation for the organization. Some persons among those members of the organization who were spokesmen of excessive population control and who were clients of family planning became staff. In search for female worker, some staffs made their wives Field Workers. The members began to run the "Integrated Family Planning Project" with nominal remuneration.

The then Sub-divisional Officer (SDO), Mr. Toufiq-e-Elahi granted PSKS some bundles of tin and it made a thatched house where the project activities began to run. The members who got opportunity to become staff, proposed for a brick-built office building instead of clay made tin-shaded previous office. But there was no money accumulated. One taka monthly subscription by the members was the only income source of the organization. To tell frankly the members used to arrange the monthly subscription by stealing and selling something from their own houses. As job opportunity was beyond their dream, the members altogether decided to donate their six-months' salary/allowance to the organization and afterwards they would continuously contribute 5% of their monthly salary/allowance as donation and if needed they would contribute more. The assets that have been created in the organization up to now are the result of their vow. Afterwards Janab Forman Ali, being satisfied with the organization, donated 2.5 decimal of land. It was possible to build a one-storied office on that land with the staff donation. Mr. A.K.M. Fazlul Haque Mia, the then District Commissioner formally inaugurated the office building. Overcoming all the barriers the organizational activities have been expanded day by day as a return of untiring efforts and dedication by the staff and members of the organization.






# EMPLOYMENT CREATION PROGRAM (LOAN PROGRAM):

The workers of the organization form groups (Samity) among the target community through individual and group discussion in order to bring their economical solvency and self-employment creation for poverty alleviation by providing the rural poor, indigent and unemployed women with various training and loan support.


Concern staff enlightens on their (group members) everyday familial and economical problems to grow awareness. They try to reach proper solution of their problems by thinking jointly. The groups are encouraged to undertake personal and joint ventures. They deposit regular savings to form capital as to strengthen their economic condition. At present there are 1,593 Samities with 25,937 members. Total savings capital of these Samities is Tk.14,60,38,631 only.


In addition to social development, Samity members are provided with loan at an endurable system to undertake income-generating activities for their economical development. Out of the total group members 25,937 at present 23,890 are using loan. This year Tk. 71,70,50,000 has been disbursed among 22,525 members for running mainly small trades, livestock and agriculture as well as vegetables cultivation.


#### Members' Welfare Fund:

Besides economical sustainability of the group members "Members' Welfare Fund" is established to prevent frustration and recurrence of poverty in members' lives. Objective of this fund mainly is to recover the unpaid loan (principal + service charge) of the group member and the excess amount to be given to the family as donation in case of death (except suicide) of any member or her husband. This fund is also provided in case of financial crisis for any surgical procedure of the member or her husband or unmarried son & daughter. Moreover, a lump sum amount of money is provided to any member's meritorious son or daughter as scholarship. In this reporting year Tk. 22,32,596 has been given to 122 members (or families) in death case and 16 members (or family members) have been provided with health services worth Tk. 43,000. Donation of Tk. 1,43,500 for education was provided to 55 meritorious students.

#### ENHANCING RESOURCES AND INCREASING CAPACITIES OF POOR HOUSEHOLDS (ENRICH) PROGRAM:

"ENRICH" is the name of a newly innovated project invented from the brain of Dr. Khalikuzzoman, Chairman of PKSF's Governing Body. The main theme of the project is overall poverty alleviation and sustainable development of the grass root level poor families as well as to ensure humanitarian manifestation of all relevant people.

# **Education Program:**

The parents and guardians of the students/learners of the poor families, being illiterate or less literate, cannot spend time for their children's education in the school. As a result the children lack in school education and at last lose their eagerness to go to school. There is arrangement for lesson learning for students between play group and class two at the education centers ongoing at afternoon shift at the aim to readiness of daily lessons (Except government holidays) on regular basis in view to prevent drop-out in primary level. As a step for awareness rising for the parents and guardians of the students of poor families about education, a monthly guardian meeting is conducted at every center. The main objectives of the program are to bring improvement of the primary level learners, manifest merits by preventing dropout and remove learners' fear about school.


#### Health Service Activity:

#### BLACK BENGAL GOAT REARING PROGRAM:

Black Bengal is one of the native species of goat which is found entire Bangladesh, West Bengal, Bihar, Assam and Odisha. The common complexion of the species is black; however, it is also found in tan, white and brown color. The size of a Black Bengal goat is small, but its body is hard. Its horns and legs are small. The weight of a male goat is 25 to 30 KG and a female weighs 20 to 25 KG. It is weak to produce milk. It is very popular in Bangladesh as it takes a small quantity of feed and produce bigger number of yeanlings. The black Bengal gets breeding age earlier than other species of goats. The she goat gets pregnant twice a year. This species gets easily accustomed of any environment and its immunity to diseases is very high. It produces high quality meat and skin.

Besides, researches have been done on poultry farming, cow rearing, its feed and and fodder, disease treatment, establishment of farms of poultry and cow for commercial production and persuaded by the result of the researches, people are establishing at large scale poultry and cow farms. But there is no significant research work on goat farming, its disease and disease treatment and establishment of commercial goat farm at government or nongovernment level. That's why only domestic farming of few goats is considered to be profitable. Though intermittent initiative of establishment of small, medium and large-scale commercial goat farms were found, they didn't succeed. There are large-sized goat farms with sufficient facilities at government level, they are not anyway profitable, but depend on subsidy for operation. PSKS is operating black Bengal Goat Rearing Program with financial support of PKSF. Under this program, the organization has its own farm where the genetic purity of this species of goat is preserved and bred; and financial and technological assistance is provided to make Black Bengal goat rearing popular at beneficiary members level and consequently it creates opportunity for poor people to establish Black Bengal goat farm at domestic level that creates way of breeding yearlings and it creates employment.

#### ALTERNATIVE DISPUTE RESOLUTION (ADR) PROJECT:

The project is to establish fundamental human rights by making the catchments population aware of law and human rights. Especially, complaints of the inexperienced and orphan children who are deprived of their legal rights for not having proper guardian as well as disputes of the women who are oppressed, neglected or abandoned by the husbands, complaints of maintenance, dowry, divorce, dower (Moharana), second marriage and torture/assaults are compromised through mediation. In addition, land disputes of the landless people, complaints arisen from the lands settled tenure, land cases of the inexperienced children, widows and helpless people are taken for compromise in order to keep up their benefit.

We can perceive from our experience that it needs a lot of money, time and for nothing exasperation to conduct a court case. Besides expenses, it is a matter of long period to reach a solution. So, to avoid court complicacy and expenses, complaints are compromised through mediation.

# Dispute Resolution (Mediation):

36 complainants applied to our Legal Aid Office to reach solution of their 77 disputes. Disputes of 21 complainants have been compromised peacefully in presence of the Legal Advisor, concerned staff and trained mediators through 33 sittings. A total number of 121 people were present during these mediation sittings. It has been possible to collect Tk. 3,42,000 from the opposition and given the same amount to the complainants as compensation







#### VILLAGE POVERTY ALLEVIATION PROJECT:

Majhpara village is situated in Bagoan Union of Mujibnagar Upazila. The village is situated at the southwest corner of the Upazila with Indian border. It is a village that is less developed than other ones. As per survey report, there are 146 day labors, 139 farmers, 30 businessmen, 16 non-resident service holders, 7 van pullers, 2 clerks, 2 drivers, 3 government service holders, 2 quack doctors, 3 masons, 5 goat farmers and 27 people who don't have any fixed profession (they collect derelict rice, white, potato etc. from fields). There are 382 families of different professions in the village, of which 174 are poor. Most of the families of the village are poor and many of them don't use sanitary latrines. The following programs have been implemented with financial assistance of NGO Foundation for socioeconomic development of the village-

# MAMONI MATERNAL AND NEWBORN CARE STRENGTHENING PROJECT:

Palashipara Samaj Kallayan Samity (PSKS) became a proud partner of Save the Children International again as one of the sub-awardee for operating USAID's Maternal and Neonatal Care Strengthening Program (MNCSP) in 2019. PSKS submitted Expression of Interest (EOI) for USAID's MaMoni-MNCSP in 2018. After passing different stages, the preapproval agreement (PAL) came into effect from 01 April 2019. However, during April and May, PSKS recruited staffs and began to implement activities from June 2019. Save the Children International provided all the project staffs and Program Focal Person with technical orientation and compliance guideline. After the orientation, PSKS has been implementing activities at the field level.

# Goal and Objectives:

The MaMoni MNCSP consortium embraces the Government of Bangladesh vision of "a Bangladesh where there are no preventable deaths of newborns or stillbirths, where every pregnancy is wanted, every birth celebrated, and women, babies and children survive, thrive and reach their full potential" and will meaningfully contribute to achieving its goals of reducing the neonatal mortality rate to less than 18/1,000 live births and the maternal mortality ratio (MMR) to less than 121/100,000 live births by 2022.

#### **ELECTION PROGRAM:**

The project was designed by Election Working Group (EWG) to address three major objectives as follows:

- 1. Enhance Transparency and Credibility of Election Processes: To enhance the transparency of the electoral processes in 2013-2014 and beyond with comprehensive domestic and regional election observation based on international best practice standards, and long-term advocacy for electoral reform;
- 2. Decrease Political and Electoral Violence: To foster increased citizen engagement in deterring political and electoral violence through election monitoring, community policing, and voter education, especially through religious leaders, designed to decrease public tolerance of political violence;
- 3. Strengthen the Quality of Representation and Democratic Accountability: To promote democratic representation and accountability by facilitating greater citizen engagement in scrutiny in elections, political affairs and governance through candidate forums and other targeted voters and civic education.

#### LIBRARY PROGRAM:

To help flourish humanistic knowledge and create scope for gaining ethical knowledge, the organization is operating a library with its headquarters at Gangni upazila. Local interested readers are gaining knowledge by reading different books and journals. The library contains a total number of 4,325 books at present.

#### SUSTAINABILITY PROGRAM:

With a view to reducing dependency upon donor agencies and making the organization self-reliant through procuring own resources, PSKS has been able to set up a husking mill and bought 0.92 acre of cultivable land and 0.72 acre residential areas as its income generating initiative.

There is a two-storied own office building of the organization in the village of Palashipara for program operation. Apart from this, two two-storied buildings (one Office & one Clinic) have been constructed at Gangni Upazila Headquarters (Village Banshbaria) with organization's own income.
